Bequest 'Par for the Cause'

Pursuing their own passions in life has motivated an adopted Hawke's Bay couple to leave gifts in their will to help others follow theirs.

Avid historian Dr Michelle Smith and former amateur golfing representative Blair Smith describe themselves as "hardworking, pretty ordinary New Zealanders" with a strong desire once they're gone, to provide financial opportunities for others.

A recent visit to update their will with their lawyer before going on holiday prompted the pair to approach Hawke's Bay Foundation to put their charitable giving into action.

"Blair always had an idea that he wanted to support Hastings Golf Club (where he is an active member), along with a few other smaller bequests between us: namely the SPCA, Women's Refuge and muscular dystrophy research. We wanted to give something back to the local causes and charities that are important to us and our lawyer suggested we get in touch with Hawke's Bay Foundation, so we did."

"We don't have any children and thought how can we put the money we've made in our lifetime to good use without burdening executors with the ongoing responsibilities of managing it. Hawke's Bay Foundation are experts in this field, they're built to last, have deep community roots and know where the needs are greatest. "We like the endowment model where the money can build up, and we can gift from the income, maintaining the body of the fund and allowing us to leave a lasting legacy."

Michelle admits she was a 'late bloomer' when he it came to finding her passion. Born with muscular dystrophy has brought with it multiple challenges, including several falls, a couple of major operations and reliance on a wheelchair, but as Michelle asserts she never let it stop or define her.

In 2010 Michelle finished her PHD and entered the museum sector where she worked as historian and curator of Papakura Museum for eight years.

"We're not philanthropists, we just want to make things a little easier for a handful of groups that are important to us, be it animals or people."

After moving to Hawke's Bay five years ago seeking a lifestyle change and better work life balance, Michelle and Blair settled in Havelock North. The five minute commute to work for Blair as Village Manager at Summerset Retirement Village is a far cry from the two hour daily commute he used to endure.

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 Soon after moving here, Michelle was approached by a local farm owner to document Kahuranaki Station's history. Several private projects later, Michelle felt compelled to set up a grant for other budding historians to assist with the costs of seeing a project through to fruition. She plans to leave a percentage of her estate to Hawke's Bay Foundation to faciliate her wishes.

"A grant for writers and researchers who don't have access to larger funds or insititutions is something I wish I had had access to when embarking on my own projects – putting together a book is not a cheap exercise! Capturing history is really important, be it family history, local history, it provides a sense of place and identity.

"Blair and I hope with the little bit we leave behind that we can remove financial barriers allowing people to follow their dreams like we've been able to. We hope it's enough to make a difference."

Blair feels fulfilled that a percentage of his estate will support 1-2 budding local golfers per year in perpetuity, with the costs of coaching, equipment, travel and entry fees through Hastings Golf Club.

Since picking up a golf club at the age of nine, Blair Smith never looked back. Making the coveted New Zealand Under 21 team and playing off a 1 handicap at his peak saw Blair reach the pinnacle in amateur ranks. Now a member of Hastings Golf Club, he is keen to support talented Hawke's Bay juniors.



"Golf has been a big part of my life and I always knew that I wanted to put something back into the game when the time comes to benefit junior golfers coming through. It's an expensive sport so if I can provide some support and opportunity to kids out there with talent who are more in need of a hand up, then I'm happy."

"We've been very fortunate in our lives and through hard work we are able to give back in this way. It feels great. It's easy to leave your money to family but it's a different world than it used to be in terms of reliance on inheritances.

"Whatever is left at the end we'll never get to be part of it but know it's going to be put to good purpose and many people (and animals) will benefit. It's easy to do and for us, it's a gift that will keep on giving long after we've gone."

'Pearl in a Whirl' Cyclone Boosts Recovery

Book sales of 'Pearl in a Whirl' – Cyclone Gabrielle's heart tugging tale of one fluffy cat amid the wreck and ruin has captured the nation and continues to raise funds for Hawke's Bay's recovery efforts.

Written by bestselling author Catherine Robertson, illustrated by Fifi Colston and published by Penguin, the book officially launched in June ahead of its release in all good book stores around New Zealand.

Since hitting bookshelves, Pearl has consistently sat in New Zealand's Top 10 Bestseller's List with every copy sold helping boost Hawke's Bay Foundation's Cyclone Relief efforts.

It's success has popular children's book illustrator Fifi Colston beaming with pride.

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The book's official launch back in Pearl's old neighbourhood at the Puketapu Pub in July was a chance for locals to get together and celebrate the cyclone's one silver lining.

For community spokeswoman Ange Mackie it was an emotional reunion.

"Pearl in a Whirl is a nice keepsake of the cyclone and what everyone went through and the bravery of those people caught up in it. It's lovely to see this book come to fruition given the trauma that Amy and her family have been through losing their home and way of life.

"Some members of the community have moved on but others are still feeling heavy and are in the daily grind of waiting for answers about their future.

Cyclone Relief in Hawke's Bay gets an All Blacks Spin

Putting a star-studded spin on cyclone relief efforts in Hawke's Bay seemed a "natural thing to do" for former Napier Boys First XV player turned All Black, Brad Weber.

The 18 test halfback, recently named as injury cover for the Rugby World Cup squad has been calling his fans to arms this Super Rugby season, with a challenge for followers to match his donations to Hawke's Bay Foundation's Cyclone Relief Fund.

To play his part, Brad personally

donated \$2 for every pass he made in Super Rugby – with 771 passes made during the season his final total donated is \$1542. Launched on Weber's Givealittle page, 195 donors have got in behind the fundraiser, taking the current collective cyclone relief total from Weber's fundraising efforts to over \$21k.

Brad is ecstatic so many Kiwis from around New Zealand heeded the call.

"I had an initial goal of raising \$10 thousand but I smashed through that real quick and thought T've got to rethink my

goals here'. It's been incredible to see so many people support the cause including fellow local rugby export Gareth Evans who donated his 50th cap jersey for the Highlanders, Ruby Tui, Paul Williams and Samisoni Taukei'aho. It's been heartwarming to see these players help out where they could."


Alongside his Givealittle page, Brad also set up two Trade Me auctions for rugby memorabilia kindly donated by some rugby royalty. Up for grabs was a 2022 All Blacks jersey fully signed by the All Blacks squad, and a 2019 Rugby World Cup Referees jersey signed by all the World Cup referees. Together, the jerseys raised over \$1500.

"Coming back to play for the Magpies and seeing places I grew up destroyed and the eye opening effects it's had on some people who are still struggling, this was my way of feeling like I am helping in some way. I've felt really helpless being stuck away with footy and unable to help physically on the ground with the clean up. I don't want what Hawke's Bay has been through to become yesterday's news and if I can bring some awareness that people here still desperately need help, then that is great."

Hawke's Bay Foundation Executive Officer Amy Bowkett is humbled by Brad's efforts.

"His enthusiasm and tenacity for our cause is inspirational and we have no doubt that he carries these skills onto

It's a long road but the community continues to put on fundraisers like this one. I think everyone's in a place of acceptance now, but they're just tired... very, very tired."

As for Pearl, she now calls Napier's Bluff Hill home and according to owner, Hawke's Bay Foundation Executive Officer, Amy Bowkett, she's adapted well to town life.

Author Catherine Roberston is certainly standing by for the next installment.

"I reckon Pearl's got a lot of adventures in her and we do have options for a sequel, who knows, hopefully not a flood story or a tsunami or earthquake... something less traumatic. I have faith that there'll be more adventures to come!"
