Foundation Fills Fundraising Gaps for Stretched Charities

A downturn in the region's charity fundraising sector has left many local non-profit leaders thankful for the support of Hawke's Bay Foundation.

The ongoing impact of Cyclone Gabrielle on top of cost-of-living pressures and a business community still in COVID recovery has left Hawke's Bay's notfor-profit sector under strain. Rising demands on services and a diminished fundraising capacity from local businesses and volunteers is having a seesaw effect, with many not-for-profit organisations left balancing growing demand against limited funding.

Helping fill the growing gap in fundraising, Hawke's Bay Foundation has recently helped sustain the operations of 51 local not-for-profit organisations through its annual funding round, totalling over \$190,000. Alongside its Cyclone Relief Fund, it takes to well over \$3M in funding assistance the region's local Community Foundation has made over the last 12 months.

Bellyful Hawke's Bay supports whānau with young babies and children with free ready-to-eat meals. Its 26 volunteers provided 144 whānau with 992 meals from Napier to Havelock North last year. With 50 referrals in the first quarter of 2023 alone, (312 meals delivered to 50 whānau), they expect growth of at least 25 percent this year.

Spokeswoman Aliesha Gordon is grateful for the grant.

"Across Aotearoa, not just in Hawke's Bay, we are seeing significant demand surges. Hawke's Bay Foundation funding means our local volunteers can concentrate on delivering front line services for whānau who desperately need us."

Hawke's Bay Foundation funding has also seen suicide awareness and prevention programme Mates4Life bolstered with \$3,000 to cover rent costs for an expanded office space.

Programme Coordinator Bronnie Coory says every donation helps deliver their kaupapa to workplaces throughout Hawke's Bay.

"Our main concern is that the effect of the cyclone is long-term – years not months. We need to ensure that the support for those affected are sustainable and are there to support those in need for the long-term. There also needs to be good support for those helping. We are seeing a lot of "helper" fatigue."

Since April this year, Mates4Life has delivered Kai & Kōrero to over 2000 people in businesses and communities affected by the cyclone.

Kaupapa Māori-based social development provider Ko Wai Tōu Ingoa Hauora offers mobile support to those in need from Wairoa to Takapau. In 2022 they supported 2476 people across the region; mainly youth, families and the elderly.

Celebrated Junior Golf Fund Tees Off

A coveted junior golf scholarship set up by the late Stuart Jones once dubbed "The Emperor" has been transferred to Hawke's Bay Foundation to ensure it continues growing in perpetuity.


The SG Jones Junior Fund was launched thirty years ago as a legacy left to the Hastings Golf Club by arguably New Zealand's finest ever amateur golfer. In life, as in passing, Stuart Jones had a passion for developing the game of the juniors.

Hastings Golf Club General Manager Michelle Campbell recalls Stuart even

in his latter years, taking a keen interest in the younger generation of players coming through.

"He was such a lovely person who would always be watching the juniors and what they were working on in their game and how they were improving. He would regularly offer nuggets of advice so it's no surprise that when he finally stepped away from representative golf, he would contribute back to the sport he loved."

Having held the fund since Stuart's passing eleven years ago, Michelle explains the time felt right for the Club



to invest with the vision of growing the principal funds and distributing only the interest each year.

"Our reasons for doing so were twofold. Hawke's Bay Foundation's reputation has certainly grown and it's a great way to keep the funds locally whilst maximizing the Foundation's wonderful community reach.

"I think its important that whilst we still honour Stuart's contribution and intent for the scholarship, that it gives us an opportunity for the fund to grow with the advantage at Hawke's Bay Foundation, for other donors to add to it - ultimately enhancing junior development within Hastings Golf Club."

Funds are distributed annually to an up and coming junior member to assist with coaching fees, equipment, tournament entries and travel expenses.

Winning the award in 2018 has been a launchpad not just for Dylan Bagley's golfing career, but his academic aspirations too.

"In 2018 I was fortunate enough to be awarded the SG Jones Junior Fund. I used the money to enter and travel to the 2018 New Zealand Amateur and the 2019 New Zealand Age Group Championships where I placed third in the Under 19 Age Group.
